Important news from the President...

What's Going On?

Hello everyone. I hope you are well.

What a frustrating year! From springtime onwards we had to keep revising our deadlines and cancelling speakers while still trying to keep members updated. The committee, forced by attendance limits and social distancing rules, convened via video using Zoom, to discuss what new arrangements could be made, as we all felt something positive had to happen.

We initially hoped to restart operations in September with our Annual General Meeting, but that eventually proved impractical. The next plan was to have a limited access workshop evening in place of a normal meeting on October 7th, but that too is now cancelled following the rule change to a maximum of 6 people in meetings.

Nevertheless we have made certain provisional arrangements for activities over the next few months, although details will almost certainly have to vary as the situation demands, but we will try to keep you all informed. Please note that we are aware that some members do not have easy access to social media or email, so please pass on information and publicity to others wherever possible.

Official Changes

The committee decided that due to inherent difficulties in the present situation, this season's AGM should be replaced by the circulation of a President's Report for 2019/20 and the 2019/20 Financial Report. The election of new officers and/or committee members will therefore be deferred until next September's AGM, the existing committee remaining in place as an emergency measure.

It was also agreed that since almost 6 month's worth of meetings and activities had been lost, no new subscriptions for existing members would be necessary before September 2021. Any already paid will be held over until then (unless repayment is requested).

The Annual Floor One Awards Show has been postponed, probably until mid-2021. The end of 2021 show should not be affected.

Use of Dunchurch Village Hall

Dunchurch Village Hall is available within certain restrictions, and we have provisionally booked it for a number of monthly meetings into next year, in the expectation that the allowable numbers will soon revert again to at least 30, and hopefully more after Christmas.

It should be quite safe as long as certain precautions are taken, which all attendees must observe as long as national guidelines remain in force, although the decision whether to attend or not is obviously a personal one. Hand and surface sanitising, social distancing and mask-wearing will be expected with different access to some facilities. Exit routes may also be revised. Members will be advised of these changes on arrival.

November 4:

Sea & landscape painter Mark Warner has already been booked to give a live demonstration of acrylic painting by Zoom. This means that he will not attend in person but will give a video'd demonstration that can be relayed direct to a personal computer or phone. The system is relatively simple and should not require any special equipment, you will simply reply to an emailed invitation.

We do not wish to exclude those members without the necessary technology, and so also hope to be able to project the live painting demonstration onto a large screen at Dunchurch for those who have limited technical access or wish to watch in (socially distanced) company with others. This would be at 7.30pm as in a normal meeting, subject to any coronavirus restrictions and changes in circumstances.

We would like your views on the Dunchurch arrangement; please let Paul Torr (01788 579982 or mrpaultorr@ googlemail.com) know if this is your preference, plus/or any comments. At the time of writing we cannot guarantee that it will be allowed, so please keep an eye open for further information.

Over the last few months, to keep us entertained, Leslie Read has been setting various painting challenges on the R&DAS Facebook page.

I hadn't tried any of them until this week, when she asked for suggestions for a new challenge, and I thought it might be fun to challenge ourselves to paint or draw with our non-dominant hand for a change – in my case that meant working right-handed.

I remember reading about Basil Ede, who after a stroke, taught himself to paint with his other hand, and within a couple of years was able to do so very proficiently, so with determination, it is obviously possible. Presumably you still have your artist's sense of composition and colour, even if the drawing is a bit wonky!

Having suggested the challenge, of course, I had to give it a go. So I drew a tiger's face – a bit of a cheat really, as the symmetry definitely helped. Still, it was certainly very difficult to do, and I had to keep my left

hand firmly in my pocket all the time to avoid automatically using it. Working quite slowly and carefully, I did find it possible, though.

It was interesting to find out that making strokes left/right or right/left, seemed to be awkward in reverse, and fine manipulation is certainly something you learn to do with practice – I am definitely not ambidextrous!

I worked in colour pencil, with some acrylic paint for the final whiskers.
The result wasn't too displeasing - not something I hope to do regularly, but it certainly gave me an absorbing

afternoon.
