### Weaving made easy

In November Amanda L'anson, a textile artist and teacher from Daventry, brought along her a remarkable Saori weaving machine and a huge collection of woven fabrics for our delight and amazement. Even the dress she wore was one of her own creations.

With a background in Social Psychology, Primary Education, Interior Design, and textiles, Amanda travelled to Japan in 2015 to train, becoming a SAORI Weaving Instructor.

After taking us through the history and development of Saori weaving we were invited to try some weaving on her hand machine. It looked complicated but some of the members were soon weaving away with enthusiasm. Those of us with an engineering background enthused over the mechanics of the machine. An interesting and inspiring evening.
